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COUNCILLOR'S CORNER

Our roads are in a poor state. Decades of underinvestment and inadequate maintenance has taken its toll. A recent report to Highland Council laid out the extent of the problem and it may take many years and a lot of planning and work to get them to an acceptable position.

Locally, in Kirkhill and Bunchrew the problem with the roads was heightened when the Moniack and Reelig burns became blocked and closed the "old A9" last year due to flooding. The event also threatened houses in Inchmore and I, personally, will never forget attending the scene to help and watching the only too real drama unfold for homeowners. Due to the efforts of a number of local people such as Chris Swift, who worked long hours in terrible weather with his colleagues to literally dig out the culvert during the height of the flood. Luckily, the waters eventually receded and there was no significant damage but it brought the problem into clear focus.

The fact that makes this flooding event even more relevant is that the potential for a dramatic breach was highlighted the previous year by several local people and, together, we alerted the Council. The problem was that whilst there was a risk to the road (under council control) the source of the problem was on private land and at first this seemed like it was going to be an impasse. It took quite a while to get all of the parties with responsibility together, however, eventually I chaired a meeting in Beauly where a groundbreaking agreement was made for the Council to work together with the landown-

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Home: 01463 831157 Mobile: 07788 715445 ers and tenants for a permanent, mutual solution, sharing the cost between them. Although this agreement was reached before the flood it came too late to avoid the incident affecting Inchmore and the road closure. Since then, however, there has been significant engineering work building new and repairing the culvert causing the problem and I am assured that this should be a permanent fix to avoid both road closures and the chance of flooding.

This was an extreme situation, however, particularly in this area there many places where small culverts, gullies and other water courses cause problems. Some of these result in long term damage to roads where earlier intervention might save great costs at a later date. I believe that we should have a work plan for our communities to list, agree priorities and gain action to fix these issues. If you would like to report such an opportunity then I would be grateful to hear from you and work with others to produce a plan for reversing the decay at drew.hendry@highland.gov.uk

Kirkhill and Bunchrew Community Energy Efficiency and Low Carbon Programme.

This is the final update on the Kirkhill and Bunchrew Community Trust's year-long Energy Efficiency and Low Carbon programme. This time last year we were applying for funding for the programme. We were in the depths of a 2nd bitter winter. Heating systems were working flat out to keep our homes warm and energy prices were on the rise.

A year on, what have we been able to achieve? Our community volunteers received electricity meters to help learn about saving energy in their homes. This has helped identify high energy lighting, learn about the energy costs of different appliances like washing machines, fridges and freezers and even wee items like computers and kettles. This helped one household reduce its electricity use and bills by 20%.

Renewable energy is an alternative to traditional electric, oil and LPG heating in our homes. Our renewable energy fair helped raise awareness of different systems for a number of local families with pupils at the primary school getting involved in renewable energy projects.

We have an excellent information resource on the community web site with information about assistance & support, "how to" guides and local renewable energy case studies.

And we have raised awareness of the impartial, free advice and support available from the local Energy Saving Trust office on 0800 512 012. So if you find yourself struggling with high energy bills, not sure how to reduce your energy use or want more information about renewable energy systems, visit the community web site at http://kirkhillandbunchrew.org.uk or call the local EST office for impartial and free advice.

1). Apologies. Ian Weir, Fred Geddes and Judith Rumbold.

2).Business Meeting.

a). The returning officer Mr Arthur Lacey opened the meeting by welcoming all and then asking for nominations for chairperson. Chris Heaton Armstrong nominated Cameron Kemp and this nomination was seconded by Karen Young. There being no other nominations for the post of Chairperson the meeting unanimously voted Cameron Kemp into office to serve until the next AGM which will be held in June 2012.

Cameron Kemp then took charge of the meeting. b). Election of Treasurer. Although Fred Geddes was absent he had sent an email to say he was available to continue as Treasurer. Caroline Crawford nominated Fred and Ally MacNeill seconded. There were no other nominations so Fred Geddes was elected to serve as Treasurer.

- c). Secretary Jim Ogilvie said he was available for re-election and there being no other nominations he was re-elected by endorsement from the whole meeting.
- d). Deputy Chairperson. Chris Heaton Armstrong was re-elected in to this post nominated by Cameron Kemp and seconded by Ally MacNeill again there were no other nominations.
- **3)**. There was now seven elected members of the Community Council and under the rules of the Highland Council we were allowed 8 full members so we could co-opt on to the Community Council one member.

lan Weir although he could not attend had intimated that he was available for election.

lan Weir was nominated by Karen Young and seconded by Nikki Maclean. Caroline Crawford nominated Ian Cowan and this was seconded by Cameron Kemp. A vote was taken and Ian Weir was duly elected.

4). Appointment of Associate Members to the **Community Council.**

The meeting held the view that it did not want to lose the expertise held by Members who were not re-elected in the recent election for members to the Community Council so Ian Cowan and Judith Rumbold were appointed as Associate members of the Community Council so that gives us 8 full members and two appointed associate members giving us a total strength of 10 members.

5). Minutes of the meeting held on Tuesday 1st November 2011 were read and approved with minor corrections. Ally MacNeill proposed and Chris Heaton Armstrong seconded.

6). Matters arising from the minutes.

At the last meeting the Community Council discussed an issue which occurred in the Highland Council which involved a secretive pay off to the ex. Head of Legal Services. This matter was reported in the Inverness Courier and the Press and Journal. This matter is now being investigated by the appropriate authority. It was felt that as we discussed this incident it should be in the minutes, but no further action was needed.

7). Flooding Problems.

Chris Swift was unable to attend the meeting tonight but through Nikki Maclean he had intimated that steady progress was being made and that at a recent meeting plans to start phase three of the remedial work had been discussed and progress had been made.

8). No planning issues reported.

9). Inverness Sothern Bypass Route.

Considerable discussion took place on this subject as there is a consultation underway for the public to express their views on the seven or eight options available to get the bypass road over the River Ness and the Caledonian Canal.

Here are details of the eight available options Maps are on the Council's web site.

OPTION 1 - Short direct link from Dores Road to Precast Yard / Weir crossing of the River Ness. Link road to follow the tow path of the Caledonian Canal embankment to a tandem Canal Bridge arrangement at Tomnahurich.

 OPTION 2 - Short direct link from Dores Road to Precast Yard / Weir crossing of the River Ness. Follow the north side of Whin Park to a roundabout at the corner of Bught Road. Follow a rising embankment across the middle of the Canal Park

Rugby Ground to a new opening bridge over the Canal. Thereafter follow a falling embankment through the Golf Club to join the A82 Trunk Road to the east of the General Booth Road junction.

- OPTION 3 Short direct crossing of the River Ness at Heraghty Lodge Flats. Follow Bught Road to a tandem Canal Bridge arrangement at Tomnahurich.
- OPTION 4 Short direct crossing of the River Ness at Heraghty Lodge Flats. From a roundabout at the corner of Bught Road follow a rising embankment across the Canal Parks Rugby

Ground to a new opening bridge over the Canal. Thereafter follow a falling embankment through the Golf Club to join the A82 Trunk Road to the east of General Booth Road junction.

- OPTION 5 Short direct crossing of the River Ness at Heraghty Lodge Flats. From a roundabout of the corner of Bught Road cross the west side of the Canal Parks Rugby Ground on a rising embankment to an opening Canal Bridge and thereafter link to the A82 Trunk Road via a falling embankment to the west of the Golf Club.
- OPTION 6 Follow a sweeping alignment along the river bank from Dores Road roundabout to cross the River Ness at the Precast Yard / Weir. Thereafter link road to follow the towpath of the Caledonian Canal embankment to a tandem Canal Bridge arrangement at Tomnahurich.
- OPTION 7 Follow a rising embankment from the Dores Road roundabout to a high level bridge across the River Ness and Caledonian Canal. Thereafter pass through the Torvean Quarry to join the A82 Trunk Road near the old quarry access .includes a tandem Canal Bridge arrangement at Tomnahurich.
- OPTION 8 Short direct link from Dores Road to Precast Yard / Weir crossing of the River Ness. Follow the north side of Whin Park to a roundabout at the corner of Bught Road. Thereafter follow an alignment in cutting through the Canal Parks Rugby Ground underneath the Canal via an aqueduct. Then follow a rising gradient in cutting through the Golf Club to link with the A82 Trunk Road and the General Booth Road junction.

Councillor Drew Hendry offered some advice to the Community Council on this issue and said that money could be the deciding factor in the decision making process and although nearly everyone would vote for the most expensive option which is number 7, can the additional cost be justified and where would that money come from?

Traffic studies show that a bypass route cannot be justified on traffic volume but the city centre does get congested with large lorries and narrow streets and a bypass would relieve most of this problem. It was decided to leave this matter over until our meeting on the 17th January to give all our members time to consider the proposals. The consultation should end on the 17th the day of our next meeting but it has been agreed that we would seek an extension of time so we can submit our opinion on the 18th.

10). A862 and Achnagairn Mansion and estate.

The Secretary reported that the centre line hatching on the A862 at the old police station had been omitted when the road had been resurfaced. This would be replaced when the weather allowed.

The management at Achnagairn mansion had promised that there would be no more loud fireworks or Chinese lanterns and that firework displays would be short and be done at a reasonable time and not late at night. They said they were fully aware of the dangers to animals and elderly people.

The houses in Achnagairn Estate are still lying as before although some fresh boards have been put up where there was no doors to restrict access. The Secretary reported that he had obtained an Aberdeen number to phone to try and establish the present owners but someone there gave out an Edinburgh number which rings on to an answering machine to leave a message and they will ring back, but no one has yet done so.

11). The secretary outlined the Connecting Carers organisation.

The Connecting Carers group offer support to carers in the Highlands. They run training and social events for carers and hope to have support workers in the area from next year. As the Community Councils operate throughout the region they want to make sure they have contact details for the Connecting Carers in case the need arises and they are asked for help from local residents.

12). A.O.B. There was no other business so the meeting was closed.
