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



In the summer term, evenings were spent beach-combing at Rosemarkie, cycling at Strathfarrar, and building shelters at Reelig Glen. The term ended with a day-trip in 15 open canoes down the River Beauly, organised by our local outdoor adventure company 'Boots and Paddles'. It was a fantastic day and we were even lucky enough to see the Aigas Ospreys.

Earlier in the year, 15 scouts, both girls and boys, enjoyed a weekend of adventurous activities at Badaguish Outdoor Centre, which was partly funded by an award from 'Cashback for Communities'. Activities included mountain biking, zip-wire trails, rock climbing and "weavling" - crawling under and over a field of boulders. It was an excellent weekend and most agreed that it was at least as exciting as the skiing that would have happened if there had been snow!

Next year, we are planning a very ambitious programme of activities around a theme of 'Exploring our Environment'. Work starts on Community **Centre extension**

Well, it's taken a while but we're happy to say the work starts on the Kirkhill Community Centre extension and refurbishment on the 20th August. So, by the time you read this things should be well on the way.

The Kirkhill Centre Forward project will provide the community with a new meeting room to complement the main hall. The new room will be warm and cosy and will accommodate up to 40 people. It will be ideal for smaller groups and for meetings. It also means that new groups can be accommodated who were previously turned away because the main hall was booked.

As well as the new meeting room the main hall will be completely renovated. We'll have a new much more spacious kitchen, new toilets, a bigger entrance hall with space for the post office/box office. And, thanks to funding from the Climate Challenge Fund, the hall will be insulated throughout to give us a much more comfortable and economical building.

This project has been a community aspiration for a long time and it's great that we are finally getting the community facilities that we need in this growing area. This couldn't have happened without the efforts of the Kirkhill Centre Forward subcommittee which has put in a huge amount of work and continues to put in many volunteer hours. It also needed the support of the community which has raised nearly £100,000 over the years through supporting Kirkhill Gala and other events.

The £334,000 project is funded from a number of sources including Highland LEADER, Climate Challenge Fund, Robertson Trust, Garfield Weston Foundation and Highland Council. Local company R&R Regeneration has been appointed as contractor.

The community centre is now closed and but access will be kept for the MUGA, recycling bins and football pitch. We should be ready to re-open in late December or certainly the New Year. Get ready for a massive party!

Woodland Group

The Woodland group had a successful year continuing our management work in the Upper Reelig Community Wood. We have benefited greatly by having the Log Building to use both as a base and meeting place. The local Bat Group has identified two species of bat that have taken up residence as well! Various areas of the wood are now showing good regeneration of native flora and woodland as a result of increasing the amount of light for plants and trees by the removal of non-native species. We have also improved the habitat for insects, birds, fungi and other organisms by increasing the amount of deadwood in the woodland.

Trust volunteers were delighted to support the Forest School sessions run by Ged Church for Kirkhill School pupils over the last few months. We helped pupils make 'dead hedges' – small enclosed areas that protect ash and other seedlings from deer - and will monitor these together over the next year to see the impact. The sessions were great fun for the group and really enjoyed by both staff and pupils –we all learned new skills together. Given the rainy summer the building came into its own as it provided shelter for the activities by the addition of tarpaulins to the gables.

Some of the equipment used in the Forest School activities was purchased with funding from the Forestry Commission Scotland's Community Seedcorn fund. We have been fortunate to again secure an award from the fund and will, in our next year, undertake a number of projects including running First Aid and Wood Carving courses – as well as purchasing some much needed equipment to support our work.

Regular visitors will know that there have been Forestry operations in the FCS woodland bordering the Community Woodland. The extraction work has now finished and hopefully all timber will be uplifted from the site soon. The Forestry Commission tell us that there is a second felling planned for 2012/13.

The Woodland Group starts its activities again in late September/early October and we would very much welcome new members. Trust members in the Clunes area are continuing to monitor the spread of Himalayan Balsam above the Reelig Glen. Areas where dense clumps of the invasive weed were pulled by groups of volunteers over the past two summers have been revisited, with only sporadic evidence of the plant remaining. The operation has drawn praise from SNH but the volunteers are aware there is still work to be done. No evidence has been found of the plant spreading into the Moniack Gorge where it could be a serious threat to the rich flora and fauna. However it has been discovered on private property higher up the water course and these new areas are now being targeted with the kind co-operation of landowners.

Cycle Path

We have a long-term plan for an off-road cycle path from Beauly to Inverness and have completed the first section from Moniack to Inchmore. We applied for funding to the Climate Challenge Fund and Leader for the section from Lovat Bridge to the Cabrich Junction but heard recently that these applications have not been successful. We are now looking to see if we can rework the applications and seek other sources of funding and are determined not to give up.

Communications

We have been working hard to improve our Community Web Site – www.kirkhillandbunchrew.org.uk and the community Facebook page. This is a great facility to keep in touch with what is happening in the community and for local groups to promote their activities. Playpark

We have now obtained quotes for the repair of the park fence and have identified funds from previous park projects to put towards the cost. We are applying to the Highland Council Ward Discretionary Budget for the balance of the cost and are grateful for the support of the Community Council and our Ward Councillors. If the grant is approved it is hoped the work will be complete by the autumn.

Environmental Group

The Recycling Point is now in the Community Centre Car Park and has bins for clear, brown and green glass and steel/aluminium cans. Please put any bags/boxes used to bring the items to the site in the wheelie bin next to the glass bins and do not leave any other items next to the bin as someone else will have to remove them. Should any glass get broken please clean it up or inform the staff in the Community Hall. It is great to have this facility in the village but we must all remember this is a public car park with lots of children running about going to the hall and MUGA so care and respect is required.

The next Litter Pick will be in the autumn but don't leave any you see until then – pick it up and bin it to help keep our village tidy over the summer!

WARDLAW CHURCH NEWS

At the time of going to press for the last issue of Crannog, Wardlaw Church was preparing for the Kirkhill Gala service. This was a happy service, conducted by Mrs Morven Archer, with a dramatic presentation by Chris Watt and Carol Hutchison from Out of the Box and their puppets. With the help of some of the younger folk in the congregation, plus Alasdair, a "not quite so young" Elder, the story of the Good Samaritan was told. The young folk enjoyed hamming it up with robes and cloaks. Alasdair played the unsuspecting

traveller on the road from Jerusalem to Jericho, and he was well and truly set upon by the caped villains.

Our Third Sunday praise events continue to grow in popularity. These take place on at 6:00 p.m. on the third Sunday of each month, concentrating on newer hymns and songs, interspersed with short readings and messages. The tea and home baking served afterwards are always a big attraction, along with the chance to meet other people from the area. The event in June featured John Moores who talked and sang his way through hymns that have marked milestones in his life, including hymns written by John himself. The July event comprised a selection of favourite hymns, old and new, which were much enjoyed and sung very enthusiastically. Several major improvements resulted from their hard work. The wire fence was removed from the top of the stone wall bordering the road and the pavement cleared of debris, making the approach to the church look somewhat friendlier and improving the appearance of the wall itself. The stone flags at the church entrance were dug up and relaid, together with extra flags to extend the level

surface at the way in to the church. Several ladies spent a long time on their hands and knees weeding the gravel paths leading into the church grounds - back-breaking work, and a definite improvement. Very many thanks to all !

A party of sixteen joined together for an afternoon tea at the Dairy at Daviot in July. It was a good opportunity to sit and chat, and this obviously necessitated the consumption of jam and cream scones, washed down with numerous cups of tea ! Sadly, we lost two well-loved and much respected ladies during July. Nancy Paterson of Drumallan, Drumchardine passed away in the early hours of July 4, with Elizabeth Macrae of Stroma, Kirkhill passing away four days later on 8 July. Both Nancy and Elizabeth will be missed very much indeed by everyone who knew them.

The Tuesday coffee mornings have proved to be very popular, and are held every week, from 10:00 a.m. till 12 noon. Anne, Mary and Maris transform our Guild Room into a (very) upmarket teashop each week, with home baking provided by themselves and other members of the church congregation. Tables are set with immaculate tablecloths, china crockery (teacups and saucers here, not your everyday coffee mugs !) and flowers, and the home baking is tremendous. We have heard that some folk have been thinking that you have to be a churchgoer to come to the coffee morning.
