Woodland Group

The group has been working with agreement of Forest Enterprise (FE) in Upper Reelig Wood. The group are working to improve the wood for access, recreation and wildlife and to encourage woodland skills. Thinning of the beech has continued to open up the wood and the thinnings sold for firewood.

A very successful Woodland Fair was held in Upper Reelig Wood in May supported by the Partnership for Rural Inverness and Nairn. Around 200 people attended.

Environment Group

The group organised litter picks and continued to investigate the formation of a wildflower meadow in the field next to the new Wardlaw Graveyard. The group continues to support the Eco-schools project at Kirkhill Primary School.

Kirkhill Community Park

The group continued to take forward a project to improve and refurbish the park in Kirkhill. Following negotiations with The Highland Council and the landowners, agreement to a 10 year lease was established. The legal process continues.

Equipment has been selected to be fully inclusive to ensure the park is well used and to create a sense of pride and real community spirit. This includes the creation of a natural play area and wild garden that includes willow sculptures and fruit trees.

Aird Community Links and Transport Group

The Aird Community Links project has now been open for 3 years. It is a network of signed minor roads and paths with an associated leaflet. Activity this year has involved monitoring and maintaining the Inchmore/ Moniack roadside path. Increasing use is made of the path particularly by walkers. The average number of journeys per week was 77 by foot and 30 by cycle for the period October to September 2005.

Negotiations between KBCT and the Highland Council TEC Services for a feasibility study for a roadside route between Beauly and Inverness are ongoing.
